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**** Another Brilliantly Conceived Left Hand Recital

Once again, Maxime Zecchini has issued a brilliant recital of unique repertoire for the left hand. Here the pianist as selected left hand transcriptions by the late Paul Wittgenstein - (1887-1961) who lost his right arm during WWI. He developed and published a three volume set entitled 'School for the Left Hand' (Universal Press - 1957) and in the third volume, there are transcribed 27 compositions by various composers to "dazzle, delight and astonish" audiences throughout the world. Several of these superb transcriptions are issued here.

These difficult transcriptions for the left hand certainly require a brilliant technic and musicality which this young French pianist has in great abundance to make these compositions come alive and they certainly do come alive here. The pianist's sensitivity, subtle approach combined with a total understanding of nuance, color, and the arts of pedal expression and the musical phrase are evident throughout this new recital.

Excellent program notes are in French and English by the artist and make for interesting reading for professional and amateur alike. **Highly recommended**. A 5 out of a 5
